

## Holy Smoke....

When I was thinking about this months column and what I wanted to convey, my mind drifted toward a conversation I have always wanted to explore. Cannabis and Religion.

My early conversations with friends and family about cannabis typically contain only facts and technical aspects of the plant. Cannabinoids and Terpenes. Indica and Sativa. Islamic countries during the 14th century and colonial countries in the 19th century both experienced wide ranging crack downs on cannabis. And then a long period of cannabis use with no major issues really. In fact our

society has really only made much noise on cannabis use in the last hundred years. First to restrict it and then to celebrate the removal of those restrictions. We are a strange species indeed.

The Bible refers to *kaneh-bosem*, that many believe could be another term for cannabis. The Zoroastrian holy book *Zend Avesta*, compiled between 559 BCE and 379 CE, makes several mentions of bhanga, the well-known Sanskrit word for cannabis.

What I found in my years of personal research boiled down to three general categories of acceptance. Modern Christianity appears to be more against its legal use than other major religions. With Buddhism and Islam being somewhere in the middle. They appear to accept CBD but not THC due to the intoxicants. Judaism appears to accept cannabis openly and freely in all its forms.

These are wide brush points of view of course and solely based on my very non-scientific research. They are not meant to suggest everyone's specific beliefs or practices. I do believe however, that religious institutions have an obligation to help educate their followers with the truth regarding cannabis.
